<p style="text-align: center;">From the Rabbi's Desk</p>	<p>My dear fellow Valley Jews and Friends,</p> <p style="text-indent: 40px;">Shalom. Our congregational year has flown by. I have difficulty believing it is already close to July, and time for the summer edition of the bulletin. Of course, this is a double edition, covering both July and August, so there is much to say here.</p> <p style="text-indent: 40px;">Be sure to plan to attend some of our summer lay-led services. In the last two years, they have been wonderful ways to spend a Shabbat evening.</p> <p style="text-indent: 40px;">Mark your calendars NOW for the end of summer pot-luck picnic at 5 pm on August 24th at the home of the Youngs.</p> <p style="text-indent: 40px;">Watch for more information to be forthcoming soon about more events and activities, including during the summer.</p> <p style="text-align: center;"><i>IN OUR COMMUNITY</i></p> <p style="text-indent: 40px;">Another year of congregational activities is coming to a close. We have a well-deserved change of pace for a time in the summer, a bit slower and more relaxed. During this time, we have the opportunity to step back, take a breath, recharge our batteries, and plan in order to be ready for the coming year. Then, we will once again jump in with both feet and start the full cycle of the year.</p> <p style="text-indent: 40px;">This has been a year that has seen much. We had the first ever congregational trip to Israel, the formalization of the Caring Committee, weekly lay-led summer services, the first full Shenandoah Valley Holocaust Education Week, the institution of the Shenandoah Valley Chevrah Kadishah, and the first ever Staunton Jewish film festival, as just a few examples of both activity and growth. At the same time, there has also been much change, with the loss of some pillars of our community, the addition of some new faces to our membership, a change in the constitution and by-laws concerning how the board operates and the congregational year, and a significant amount of maintenance and upgrades to the facility in accordance with the outline developed by the board at their strategic planning retreats in the last few years. The congregation is stronger and sounder than it was when I arrived, and the community is more active, vibrant, and Jewishly engaged. There is much of which we can all be proud.</p> <p style="text-indent: 40px;">Looking at all this, I find it is hard to realize that I have been your rabbi for five years at this point. It seems both a much shorter time (because the time has flown by), and a much longer time (because I feel as if we have been working together to build our community forever, and it just feels natural and right). I am grateful for the opportunity to serve this community and to work with so many of you, to enjoy associating with good people doing important things. I am also very</p>

humbled by the trust you have placed in me, allowing me to share in your troubles, to delight in your simchas, and to be a witness to the events and milestones in your lives. I am blessed by this gift, received from each one of you, and I can only acknowledge how awed I feel by it.

THE CALENDAR & HOLIDAYS

SIVAN → TAMUZ (JULY)

Sivan ends on July 3rd, and July 3rd and 4th are Rosh Chodesh for Tamuz. Tamuz will run from July 4th to August 1st, and Rosh Chodesh for Av will be August 2nd.

July 20th is the 17th of Tamuz, which is traditionally a fast day, commemorating the siege of Jerusalem leading to its fall and capture. This day is the beginning of the three week period of mourning leading up to Tisha Be'Av (the 9th of Av), which commemorates the destruction of the Temple.

TAMUZ → AV → ELUL (AUGUST/SEPTMEBER)

Tamuz ends on August 1st. Av begins the 2nd, and runs until the 31st of August. August 31st and September 1st are Rosh Chodesh for Elul.

The evening of the 9th of August and the 10th are Tisha Be'Av, the 9th day of Av. This is traditionally the saddest day in the Hebrew calendar. It commemorates the final taking of the Temple and its destruction. This is seen by some as the day on which all disasters have befallen the Jewish people. Both the first (586 B.C.E.) and second (70 C.E.) destruction of the Temple are said to have taken place on this day, many pogroms are reputed to have occurred on this day, and some claim that the plans for 'the final solution' of the Nazis were conceived and approved on this day. The custom is to sit as mourners at night, on low stools or on the floor, barefoot, and in low light read the book of Lamentations on Tisha Be'Av (relating to the conquest of and exile from Jerusalem by the Babylonians, and their destruction of the Temple). It is a solemn liturgy, and serves to bring one to sober reflection, which is the appropriate spirit for Elul, as we examine our selves and our deeds, in preparation for Rosh Hashanah, the days of awe, and Yom Kippur that will arrive at the end of Elul.

SOME ITEMS OF NOTE

I want to highlight a few things that are recent or will be coming up in the months ahead.

The Confirmation celebration and Shavuot service was observed on June 6th at Beth El. Shorty led that service. As in past years, at this Confirmation service I felt bittersweet: happy for the excited young adults who are about to go elsewhere and continue to make us proud of them, and sad because they will not be in our midst as they have been for so many years. Each one of the confirmands was asked to share their thoughts at this service as their divrei Torah (words of instruction or Torah). I think all who were there were touched, and could see the quality of these persons we are sending out into the world. I am sure that we can all be proud of them.

Shorty had a shul-in following the Confirmation service, on June 6th to 7th at Beth El, including their annual mid-night bowling! On the 7th, Shorty members went for an overnight trip to Williamsburg, and had a great time. I accompanied

them – I think I am still recovering! ☺

June 9th and 10th (starting at sundown June 8th) was Shavuot, the holiday celebrating the giving/receiving of Torah, and Revelation.

June 20th was the last rabbi-led service before the summer schedule begins at THOI. June 27th was the last rabbi-led service at Beth El.

June 29th will be the unveiling for Dave Merlin in New Jersey. It will take place at 2 pm at the Holy Society Cemetery in Hopwood, near Uniontown. If anyone wishes to go, please be in touch and we can talk about car pooling for a day trip.

There will be a Shabbat service weekly at Beth El. When the rabbi is not present, these services are lay-led. At THOI, starting July 18th, there will be a lay-led Shabbat service every other week through the summer. Come and support your fellow congregants as they take on leadership roles in the service, including service leading, delivering divrei Torah, and Torah and Haftarah reading, and enjoy schmoozing at the Oneg Shabbat afterwards.

The joint calendar committee met in June and set the schedule of services and other calendar events, which determines many of the activities and events for the summer and coming year. Watch for the calendar to be sent out soon.

Looking at the summer, we have lay-led services scheduled as noted. Our calendar is less full, as many of our members are away on vacations, but there is a constant hum of activity as doings continue, with maintenance and upgrades of the building, planning and preparations for the coming year, regular services, and a few events planned.

Come September, we hit the ground running. Religious school, Selichot, the High Holy Days, and all the activities of our congregation take off in full gear!

OTHER PROGRAMS & SPECIAL ACTIVITIES

If you have been meaning to learn how to read Hebrew (or improve your reading) in order to better follow services, speak with the rabbi: there is a possibility of a summer class with a native Hebrew speaker if there is enough interest, and regular classes will again be scheduled for the fall. If you are interested in studying for and celebrating a B'nai Mitzvah, or in learning to leyn (read/chant) Torah and/or Haftarah, or to lead services, or serve as a gabbai, or you wish to discuss conversion, please be in touch with the rabbi. Similarly, if you feel a conversation with the rabbi on any topic would be of benefit to you, please be in touch to make an appointment. You can call or email Rabbi Joe.

Please know that we always seek congregant and guest participation in services throughout the year. If you are interested in taking a role in a service, please be in touch with Rabbi Joe or Don Chodrow or Beth Young. Roles include: reading Torah, reading Haftarah, delivering a Devar Torah, serving as Gabbai (the "MC" for the Torah service), reading an English reading, or having an honor. The Honors we usually confer in our services include being called up for an Aliyah (saying the blessings for the Torah or the Haftarah), serving as Hagbah (lift, hold, and carry the Torah), Gelilah (undressing and dressing the Torah), or Petichah Usegurah (opening and closing the Ark).

Rabbinic Education Initiatives

Be prepared for a set of new programs and classes come fall. We will again be offering the Crash Course in Reading Hebrew, where those who can't read Hebrew at all will be brought to the point of sounding out and following the Hebrew in our prayerbooks in only six sessions! This will start in November.

There has been a request to again offer the Introduction to Judaism course. This is useful if you simply want to know more about Judaism (including history, holidays, life cycle events, the structure of services, and customs and practices), and is a prerequisite to those who may be thinking about conversion. This is a twenty-session course. If you have any interest in taking this course, please be in touch with Rabbi Joe as he prepares plans on when and where to present it. And if you know of anyone else who might want to take such a course, please encourage them to contact Rabbi Joe.

Rabbi Joe is considering a new series of monthly classes following a theme.

In one such series, we would look at the Tanakh, and especially at the doings of the women included, and try to tease out a bit of their stories, as well as look at the historical and contextual world in which those stories are unfolding. The setting for this class would be a seminar in which we would look at the story of one woman in each class, and read the text (in English), talk about the background, and discuss the story.

Another possible series could be along the lines of "Everything you wanted to know about 'X' in Judaism (but were afraid to ask)". We could look at food, sex, relationships, business, speech, community, prayer, and many other topics. Each class would be a standalone, so no one would be compelled to commit to all the topics.

A shorter series, perhaps three classes, could be an examination of the Prayer service, in which we would examine the source, structure, development, and practices of the three daily services, and the variations for holidays.

Two other classes could be 'How to be a Gabbai' (master of ceremonies for the Torah service), and 'How to be the Shaliach Tzibur' (service leader).

The URJ recently suggested that congregations offer an adult education class on Islam as part of their interfaith dialogue with the Muslim community. If there is interest in this, we could explore having a class or course on this topic.

Please let Rabbi Joe know if these possibilities would be of interest to you, or if you would like to suggest other topics for classes and courses.

Adult Education Initiatives

In an entirely different direction, we have several congregants and local experts who have volunteered to present a variety of programs. For example, Richard Marks, Gordon Bowen, Lou Boden, and others have said they would be happy to offer a lecture or presentation to our congregants. We are hoping to arrange this throughout the year, and present an ongoing 'lernhaus' on different topics. We may also try to arrange for group visits to the Blackfriars theater again, as that seemed to be very well received. We can also ask if Ralph Cohen will be available to speak to us about the plays, as he did recently for The Jew of Malta.

Be on the lookout for a call for volunteers in various areas, and be prepared to offer your time, energy, and enthusiasm to help the chairperson, Laurie Berman, to make this an even greater success next year.</p> <p>We don't currently have a social action committee or chair; if you would like to work in this area, please speak to Beth Young. There are many opportunities that are open to us to perform Tikkun Olam (repair of the world) and Gemilut Chasidim (acts of loving kindness), from supporting the Blue Ridge Area Food Bank to working at the Volunteer Farm, and much more. The possibilities are limited only by imagination and energy.</p> <p>There are many other possibilities to volunteer and help our community continue to grow and be vibrant – please consider signing up and taking on one or more of these roles.</p>
