## From the Rabbi's Desk

My dear fellow Valley Jews and Friends,

Shalom.

Rosh Hashanah has come and gone. We are now in the midst of the solemn time of the Yamim Nora'im (days of awe). In a very short time, it will be Yom Kippur (the day of atonement).

## **IN OUR COMMUNITY**

The congregation has been a busy place. Rabbinic education initiatives, services, social action, and Tzedakah efforts have all started up and are in full swing. We have some new students in the Religious school, and the all-new Pre-School

program is moving forward. Planning for the High Holidays is complete and we are in the midst of them now. There are new social events being planned. The Chevrah Kadishah (holy burial society) continues to move forward. The caring committee is operating. We have determined to undertake some social action projects as a community. The board is actively working on improvements for the congregation. This is looking to be a full and very active year.

I hope that you will take advantage of all that our community offers, as well as make your own contribution to our community. There is always room for another pair of hands and a willing heart.

There is a lot to share this month. First off, if you are looking for information on events at the congregation, our Webmaven has done a wonderful job, and we now have another excellent resource: a lovely, easy to use, interactive calendar on the web site that shows events, services, activities, holidays, and much more. You can also click on an event and see more details (if any are included) of that event. This online calendar shows those events that are at THOI, Beth El, and Other locations, as well as allowing you to see the rabbi's availability on given days.

## ***THE CALENDAR & HOLIDAYS***

### **TISHREI → CHESHVAN (OCTOBER)**

Tishrei runs from September 30<sup>th</sup> until October 29<sup>th</sup>. The 29<sup>th</sup> and 30<sup>th</sup> of October are Rosh Chodesh (new month/moon) for Cheshvan. Cheshvan runs from October 30<sup>th</sup> to November 29<sup>th</sup>, and the 30<sup>th</sup> of November is Rosh Chodesh Kislev.

The evening of September 29<sup>th</sup> was Erev Rosh HaShanah (evening of Rosh HaShanah, the New Year). Rosh HaShanah day was on September 30<sup>th</sup>, and for those who celebrate two days, October 1<sup>st</sup>.

We are starting this month (October) in the midst of the Yamim Nora'im and will arrive at Yom Kippur with the Erev Yom Kippur (with Kol Nidre) service on evening of the 8<sup>th</sup> of October, with Yom Kippur day being the 9<sup>th</sup>.

The Yamim Nora'im (days of awe) are seen as a time given us to finish the work of doing Teshuvah and making amends with others in advance of Yom Kippur, a period when we are given an opportunity to amend our ways, seek forgiveness, and prepare ourselves to be ready and fit to turn and return to G-d, and to acting in a godly way. In the final moments of Yom Kippur, we understand at a deep level the metaphor that our chance to make amends is now drawing to a close, the gates of prayer are closing, the day of judgement is ending, our last opportunity to seek a merciful judgement is drawing to a close, and we are approaching the moment of the sealing of the book of life for the coming year with the decree of judgement contained for us therein. Truly a time of awe for anyone who has sincerely examined their deeds and past failings.

Very shortly after Yom Kippur, starting Monday, October 13<sup>th</sup> in the evening, we enter into the celebration of the holiday of Sukkot (the festival of booths). Sukkot

is an eight day festival, so it ends at sundown on the 21<sup>st</sup>, but we slide directly into the next holiday, Simchat Torah, picking up the evening Sukkot concludes, and the holiday period goes right through until sundown the next day (the 22<sup>nd</sup>).

There will be a Sukkot service on the evening of Monday, October 13<sup>th</sup> at Temple House of Israel. It is open to the both congregations. We will begin at 6 pm with 'Pizza in the Hut' – a meal and celebration of Sukkot, the Feast of Booths, in the Sukkah at THOI. I am hoping that we will also have lots of people, especially young ones, there to help decorate the Sukkah further – there is never such a thing as too many paper chains! ☺ We will follow with a service at 7:30 pm to celebrate the holiday, including readings from the Torah and Haftarah.

On Friday, the 17<sup>th</sup> of October, we will have a service for Shabbat at Beth El, and we will celebrate Simchat Torah then. Again, I hope everyone will come and join in. as we march and dance with the Torahs, and read the very end of the Torah, turning immediately to start over at the very beginning! This will also be the Consecration service for new students in the religious school.

### ***SOME ITEMS OF NOTE***

I want to highlight a few things that are recent or will be coming up.

You should find a Jewish calendar available to you at High Holiday services, courtesy of Reynolds Hamrick Funeral Home. Please feel free to take one.

There is a Shabbat service weekly at Beth El. When the rabbi is not present, these services are lay-led. Consult the congregational calendar for details, and see the website, Bridge, and announcements for any changes.

At THOI, there is a rabbi-led Shabbat service generally every other week. Consult the congregational calendar for details, and see the website, bulletin, and announcements for any changes.

Be sure to bring your tickets for High Holy day services, and expect to be asked to show them, or to confirm your name on the list of those to be admitted.

### ***OTHER PROGRAMS & SPECIAL ACTIVITIES***

If you feel a conversation with the rabbi on any topic would be of benefit to you, please be in touch to make an appointment. You can call or email Rabbi Joe.

Please know that we always seek congregant and guest participation in services throughout the year. If you are interested in taking a role in a service, please be in touch with Rabbi Joe or Don Chodrow or Lisa Warren. Roles include: reading Torah, reading Haftarah, delivering a Devar Torah, serving as Gabbai (the "MC" for the Torah service), reading an English reading, or having an honor. The Honors we usually confer in our services include being called up for an Aliyah (saying the blessings for the Torah or the Haftarah reading), serving as Hagbah (lift, hold, and carry the Torah), Gelilah (undressing and dressing the Torah), or Petichah Usegurah

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<p><b>Message from the President</b></p>	<p>Dear Members and Friends of Temple House of Israel,</p> <p>I have often joked that the real reason most Jewish holidays last more than one day is so that the card we meant to send has a chance of getting to its recipient in a somewhat timely fashion. When a holiday has more than 7 days, I've said that we were to stop procrastinating and, instead, to prepare and actually DO something. At Rosh Hashanah, this is doubly important. We've had the entire month of Elul to be thinking about, making steps in the direction of, and planning to take the time for a re-evaluation of our own past year.</p> <p>It is the beginning of a new year; the year 5769, beginning the evening of September 29<sup>th</sup>. Please join me in looking over your own past actions (I'll stick to mine and you look over yours!) both within your families: to spend quality time together and within the broader community: inform yourselves and vote in the coming state and presidential elections. Please also look at the supportive Jewish community of which you are a part. The people of this congregation are very special. Each of us, all 44 family members and our friends, make it possible to hire our Rabbi, hold regular Shabbat services and be part of the continuing education that is Judaism. The High Holy Days in religious services, in food (of course!) and in community are a prime</p>								

	<p>example of what we do for each other. Join Rabbi Joe, at the beginning of his new 5 year contract, and Rabbi Sue, who will be leading us for the 13<sup>th</sup> year, and Laura Mandeles who has provided us with her wonderful singing voice, in celebrating Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and renew your commitment to Temple House of Israel.</p> <p>L'Shana Tova! <p><b>Adult Education</b></p>	<p><b>Torah Parashiot</b></p> <p>The Torah parashiot (Torah portions) read for the period covered by this newsletter include the following in October: Vayelech, Ha'azinu, Chol Hamo'ed 3d day Sukkot Shabbat, Vezot Habrachah, and Bereshit, drawn from Devarim (Deuteronomy) 31:1 to the end of the Torah, and Bereshit 1:1-2:3.</p> <p>Haftarot read on Shabbatot (Sabbaths) in October include selections from Hosea 14, Micah 7, Joel 2, 2 Samuel 22, Zechariah 14, Joshua 1, and Isaiah 42-43.</p> <p>The Torah parashah (portion) for Yom Kippur morning is from Devarim (Deuteronomy) 29-30, Parashah Nitzavim, telling us that we stand today before G-d, and describing the covenant, and the commandments, along with the choice of the blessing or the curse/life or death.</p> <p>The Haftarah (reading from the prophets) for Yom Kippur morning is from Isaiah 58, concerning what sort of fast day and sacrifice and what actions G-d seeks of us.</p> <p>The Torah reading for Yom Kippur afternoon for the Reform movement is from Vayikra (Leviticus) 19, and lays out some of the commandments setting forth central ethical precepts. Other congregations may read from Vayikra 18, which concern a different group of commandments.</p> <p>The Haftarah reading for Yom Kippur afternoon is the book of Jonah. 'Nuff said, I think.☺</p> <p><b>Rabbinic Education Initiatives</b> Some of the classes/courses have begun!</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. If you are interested in or wish to consider conversion, or just want to learn more about Judaism (whether you are Jewish or not), you are invited to take the Introduction to Judaism (ITJ) course, offered beginning September 14<sup>th</sup>. This is useful if you simply want to know more about Judaism, and is a prerequisite to those who may be thinking about conversion. This will be a twenty-two class session course [so it is NOT TOO LATE to sign up] covering holidays, life cycle events, some history, practices, beliefs, customs, literature, and a smattering of other matters. Students will also be asked to attend some services and events, and go on a limited number of field trips during the course of the year. The classes will meet on Sunday afternoons, usually at 4-6 pm. The location will be provided to those who sign up (either Staunton or Harrisonburg). The next two class</li> </ol>

meeting (as I write this, on September 28<sup>th</sup> and October 5<sup>th</sup>) will be at Temple House of Israel in Staunton (due to other events on the calendar). If you know of anyone else who might want to take such a course, please encourage them to contact Rabbi Joe. We have twelve signed up for this class now, and the discussions have already been lively!

2. In a series of classes that follow a theme, but each one is stand alone, I intend to look at the Tanakh in some detail, and especially at the doings of the women included in various sections, and try to tease out a bit of their stories, as well as look at the historical and contextual world in which those stories are unfolding. The setting for this class would be akin to a seminar in which we would look at the story of one woman in each class, and read the text (in English), talk about the background, and discuss the story. I am scheduling this as a Sunday afternoon class, from 2-3:30 or 4 pm. It will be held monthly. Some months we will be at THOI, but the bulk of the classes will meet at Beth El in Harrisonburg. The first class was on September 14<sup>th</sup> at Beth El. We took a look at Chava (Eve) and the 'other' woman, focusing on chapters 1 and 2 of Bereshit (Genesis). We had a great discussion, and it was really quite a lot of fun. The next class will be on October 12<sup>th</sup> at 2 pm at Beth El in Harrisonburg. Our topic will be a few of the women along the way in chapters 3-11, and then we will begin with a close look (probably over two sessions) at Sarah.
3. If you have been meaning to learn how to read Hebrew (or improve your reading) in order to better follow services, speak with the rabbi: a beginner's class has been scheduled for the fall, to begin in November, on Monday the 10<sup>th</sup> at 6 pm. This is envisioned to be a six session course, including mastery of the alefbet and vowels, an initial introduction to some vocabulary of the liturgy, and some writing practice (new this year) to reinforce what we have covered. This course is similar to what has been offered in past under the titles Introduction to Hebrew, Crash Course in Reading Hebrew, and Read Hebrew America.
4. If you are interested in studying for and celebrating a B'nai Mitzvah, or in learning to leyn (read/chant) Torah and/or Haftarah, or to lead services, or serve as a gabbai, please be in touch with the rabbi. Classes are planned for later this year. More information will be forthcoming soon.

Much farther ahead:

5. Another series of monthly stand alone classes will be titled "Everything you wanted to know about 'X' in Judaism (but were afraid to ask)" (EYWTKA). We will look at food, sex & relationships, business ethics, speech, community, prayer, and many other topics. Because each class stands alone, no one would be compelled to commit to all the topics; you could attend when it is convenient and still fully participate. We will start this class in January, at 7 pm, and it will alternate between Thursdays at Beth El and Mondays at THOI.
6. A shorter series of two to three classes, will be an examination of the Prayer service, in which we would examine the source, structure, development, and practices of the three daily services, and the variations for holidays. This will begin late in January.
7. Two other classes will be a 'How to be a Gabbai' (HTBA) (master of ceremonies for the Torah service) class, and 'How to be a Shaliach Tzibur' (service leader) two-part series. These will also begin in January.
8. A multi-session class that will meet about twice a month starting in January will be Torah with Commentary (TWC). In it, we will look at a Torah parashah, and

read along with it several of the commentators writings on that section. We will discuss what their questions may have been, as well as what our questions would be. This is another set of standalone classes – one need not attend all of the sessions.

9. Torah Limud – a monthly Torah study session at Beth El that looks at that week’s Torah Parashah and tries to fit it into the context of the larger story. Open for discussion. This will usually take place on Friday evening from 6:30 to 7:30, and you are welcome to bring a meal to eat while we talk. On some occasions, it will be moved to Saturday morning, when we have a Shabbat morning service, and in that case, will follow the service, and any Kiddush that is offered. The first session was Saturday morning, September 20<sup>th</sup> following the Shabbat morning service at Beth El. We had a nice group remain after the Kiddush luncheon for a little learning. The next session will be November 7<sup>th</sup> (delayed due to the High Holy days).
10. Torah Lishmah – a monthly text study session at THOI that looks at something in the way of a Jewish text, drawn variously from Torah, Nevi’im (Prophets), Ketuvim (Writings), Talmud, the Zohar, and other Jewish texts. Open for discussion. This will usually take place on Friday evening from 6:30 to 7:30, and you are welcome to bring a meal to eat while we talk. On some occasions, it will be moved to Saturday morning, when we have a Shabbat morning service, and in that case, will follow the service, and any Kiddush that is offered. The first session was Friday, September 12<sup>th</sup>, at 6:30 pm, prior to our Shabbat evening service at THOI. The next session will be October 31<sup>st</sup> (delayed due to the High Holy days).

Please let Rabbi Joe know if these possibilities would be of interest to you.

### **Adult Education Initiatives**

In an entirely different direction, we have several congregants and local experts who have volunteered to present a variety of programs. For example, Richard Marks, Gordon Bowen, Lou Boden, and others have said they would be happy to offer a lecture or presentation to our congregants. Perhaps we can encourage someone to lead a series on Islam and Judaism – a topic that the URJ has suggested would be valuable for congregations to study as a group. I am hoping we can arrange these kinds of programs throughout the year, in addition to the rabbinic offerings, and present an ongoing ‘lernhaus’ on a variety of different topics. We will likely also try to arrange for a group visit to the Blackfriars theater again, as that seemed to be very well received. We can also ask If Ralph Cohen is available to speak to us about the plays, as he did recently for The Jew of Malta.

The Shenandoah Valley Holocaust Education Week is a major initiative. It needs more hands and energy than any one person can provide. If you would like to be part of making this happen, please speak to Rabbi Joe. Planning is going to get under way very soon.

The Staunton Jewish Film Festival was a significant success. We are hoping to repeat it next spring. Be on the lookout for a call for volunteers in various areas, and be prepared to offer your time, energy, and enthusiasm to help the chairperson, Laurie Berman, to make this an even greater success next year.
